WHAT MAKES YOU CRY? Um... frustration... onions... and this fab video by Elton John that was banned. I don't know what it was called but it was for a song by Tom Robinson. [A/N: I really don't know what this was. Anyone?] It was about two boys at a public school. This boy has a crush on an older boy and he gets pushed around and victimised. "Have the courage to get up and do what you really want," Bronski Beat insist. They should talk. Jimi Somerville, Steve Bronski and Larry Steinbachek, who named their electro-jive combo after the kid in *The Tin Drum* whose voice shattered glass, are darn right proud to be political, socialist and gay—without outrageous clothes and makeup.

The boy-next-door Bronskis are also Britain's latest reluctant popstars. Their first single, the poignant "Smalltown Boy," zipped up the charts faster than you can say "best thing since Yaz(oo)!" and no wonder. Jimi's soaring, bluesy falsetto is as addictive as the disco-moderne synth hooks. In a word (well, two), simply stunning!
